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Dear Friends,

As I write this it is just mid-way through November and this letter is for the December/January joint edition. I could, therefore, choose from a variety of topics including Advent, Christmas or New Year, as the magazine covers all of these seasons.

In church we are preparing for lots of different events for this period and life seems busier than ever.

I'm sure that most of us could benefit from concentrating on Advent as a time for serious reflection on our faith journey so far and actively resisting the temptation to jump ahead to the celebrations of our Lord's birth and New Year, surrounded as we already are by all the trappings of Christmas.

However, in our family lives most of us are probably already involved in future planning and preparations for the things ahead. Among them, no doubt, is the difficult task of choosing suitable gifts for friends and family.

Those who know me well know that my choices tend to be a little conservative – not quite socks and handkerchiefs, but not exactly adventurous and imaginative things either. To be honest my wife Alison is the one who comes up with the ideas for most of the things we give.

Christmas Nativity scenes nearly always include the visit of the Wise Men/Magi bearing gifts for the baby Jesus but the actual date for this is the sixth of January when we celebrate the Epiphany. If you thought choosing gifts for your family and friends was difficult

imagine having to choose what you would bring as a gift for the Saviour of the World!



The Wise Men, as any child can tell you, brought gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. Perhaps not the first things you would think of as gifts for a child!

Theologians have puzzled for centuries why they chose these particular things. The consensus seems to be that they chose the gifts as befitting a King, Priest and Sacrificial Lamb.

Gold was the usual offering given by subjects to their king; frankincense (a kind of aromatic incense derived from tree sap) was used by a priest in the Temple; and myrrh (a bitter-tasting aromatic gum extracted from a thorny bush called "balsamodendron myrrha" used for embalming the dead) for one who would be given up to die. All three were among the costliest items available at the time.


Our gifts to Jesus do not need to be so extravagant but they do require just as much thought, and ultimately are even more costly. Obviously, we cannot give Jesus the usual wrapped-up present so what might he want from us? Well, the truth is that I can't tell you because I don't know! We each have to work the answer out for ourselves. We are all unique, our circumstances are different and our talents and abilities are all different. So, therefore, our gifts to Jesus will be different too. They may be a mixture of gifts arising from our money, time and talents.

What I can tell you is that God will honour your gift if it is given from a thankful heart after prayerful consideration. I hope that we can all make the time to consider for ourselves what Jesus might want from us in 2020.

May God bless us and the work we do in his name: may you be granted a happy, holy and blessed Advent, Christmas and New Year.

Still together in that blood soaked field on a peaceful Belgian farm.







Farewell Message

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to say my goodbyes through the pages of your magazine and, in so doing, to reflect upon my time as Headteacher at Farnworth CE Primary and the importance of St Luke's Church for me personally and to the school as a whole throughout this time.

I joined Farnworth CE Primary School in September 2011 and from the outset experienced a warm and open welcome from all at St Luke's; from the church wardens to the congregation I was genuinely made to feel that I belonged - this feeling has never abated. During my time at the school I have had the good fortune to work alongside four incumbents: Reverend Helen Morby, Reverend Helen Blackburn, Reverend Laura Leatherbarrow and, most recently, Reverend Bob Pearson. I valued the wisdom and spiritual guidance that each provided in their own inimitable ways and am deeply indebted to each of them for their support. Indebted too to the work of the Foundation Governors - Gillian Deans and Ann Mather – whose commitment to the work of the Governing Body has been truly appreciated by the rest of the Governors and me.

I am proud that in May 2016 the school received an outstanding SIAMs judgement and that we have been awarded two Church School Partnership Awards. The SIAMs report of May 2016 was clear about the strength of the relationship between school and church:

'Extremely strong links between the school and St. Luke's church facilitate dynamic spiritual and social development within school and in the wider Christian

community...The school worships in the parish church for major festivals and this enables children and their families to feel part of the wider worshipping community. Members of the congregation lead the children through the Experience Easter stations, playing an important part in the development of children's ability to reflect and pray. They also lead worship with Key Stage 1 using Open the Book.' Indeed, Open the Book holds a special place in the children's hearts as it does in my own. It is wonderful to see how the children relish listening to and actively participating in the Bible stories which are brought to life through animated story telling and drama. I know the children really look forward to seeing the Open the Book team - both in school and out and about in the community – and I have loved hearing the various anecdotes of when these brief encounters take place. My final reflections turn to someone who holds a special place in the life of Farnworth CE Primary School and who, through her steadfast and selfless approach, has greatly enriched so many aspects of our work. Sue Smither has been my North Star throughout my headship and the school has been truly blessed to have her constant love and support for more years than she may herself care to mention! Thank you, Sue. It has been a pleasure and a privilege to work in such a joyful and distinctive school community and to have shared this experience with people who are true servant leaders. Thank you all for helping me on my journey; I will miss you all and wish you every blessing for the future. **Jackie Stillings**



Fabric report by Barry Horabin

Since our last Fabric Report a lot of developments have taken place. After almost two years of work and countless meetings we have had the sad news that our Grant application was not successful, mainly due to last minute demands for information from The Victorian Society and SPAB, that we only just made the deadline. Because this project was deemed to be contentious in the eyes of these societies questions were asked about the financial situation of the church and the need for such drastic alterations to such a beautiful medieval Church. All these questions have been answered and discounted. To our rescue came the Chancellor himself, His Honour Judge Graham Wood who attended a service of Holy Communion and part of a Baptism Service which impressed him and enabled him to see the need that we had. The visit was successful. He totally supported us. The Faculty was awarded and two days later it was despatched to Widnes and was duly forwarded to the Viridor Grant offices. Unfortunately most of the money for this tranche of funding had already been allocated and we will now have to apply after Christmas for the next window of opportunity in February. I am looking at this setback as a minor glitch in which has been to date, a very informative and educational experience but equally disappointing all the same. We still fully intend to re-submit our application in February and hope for a more successful outcome next time. We are meeting with Grants people from the council to form a strategy for re-submission and check for any details which may need to addressed.
