THANK YOU, THANK YOU, THANK YOU

Dear Friends,

Imagine this scene. You are on the Florida coast and you see an old man with curved shoulders, bushy eyebrows and bony features carrying a bucket of shrimp. He carries it to the end of the pier and looking up begins to throw handfuls of the bucket's contents into the air. In seconds he is surrounded by gulls. They land on his hat, on his shoulders and begin to eat the shrimp with great excitement. Even after the bucket is empty they linger, the old man and his feathered friends.

This happened every week in this particular part of the U.S.A until the death of the old man. His name was Eddie Rickenbacher, a famous World War II pilot. His plane, the 'Flying Fortress', went down in 1942 and no-one thought he would be rescued. The story is still well known of how he and his eight crew members escaped death by climbing into two rafts for thirty days. They fought thirst, the sun and nine-foot sharks (their rafts were just eight feet long) but what nearly killed them was starvation – their rations were gone in just eight days.

Rickenbacher wrote that even on those rafts they would have a daily afternoon time of prayer. One day, after their devotions, Rickenbacher leaned back with his hat over his eyes and tried to sleep. Within moments he felt something perch on his head and he knew in an instant that it was a gull. But they were hundreds of miles from land. Where did it come from? He was also certain that if he didn't catch that gull he and his crew would die. Soon all the others on the two boats noticed the bird. No-one spoke, no-one moved. Rickenbacher quickly grabbed the bird and with thanksgiving they ate the bird's flesh. They used the intestines as fish bait and survived.

Rickenbacher never forgot that visitor, that sacrificial guest and every week he went out on the pier with a bucket of shrimp to say, "Thank you, thank you, thank you".

The apostle Paul wrote, "For Christ's love compels us..." (2 Corinthians 5:14). The word 'compels' means literally, 'leaves me no choice.' Paul is saying, "I have no choice but to respond to the love of Christ with my whole being – to say, thank you, thank you, thank you!" When we serve Christ, when we share God's love with others, when we come to church each week to worship him, when we give generously a portion of all that we have received we don't do it grudgingly. We do it with thankful hearts because we really have no choice. It's how we say thank you to God for all that he has given us.

This month on Sunday 10th October we will be giving special thanks at our annual Harvest Festival and as usual we will be collecting produce to be shared out later with needy families via the Food Bank. If you would like to show your gratitude to God by bringing something for others can I request that, although fresh produce is still welcome for decoration purposes, it would be helpful if donations were mainly of the tinned or packet type so that they would have a reasonable shelf life?





Next month we give thanks for the lives of our dear departed loved ones. On 7th November, the nearest Sunday to All Souls, we will be having a special service also known as 'The

Commemoration of the Faithful Departed' – this will be at 6pm. We will be writing to the families of those whose funerals we have taken over the last year inviting them to attend. The service of course is for all who want to give thanks for departed loved ones, no matter how long ago or recently they died. Please come and help us to give thanks as we read out the names of our departed loved ones during the service.

May God help us to be truly grateful for his goodness to us and may he continue to pour out his blessings on you and on all his creation.

Heritage Day by Barry Horabin

On Saturday 11th September we held our annual Heritage Day Celebration with guided tours round the church and Farnworth's Historic Village. Numbers attending this year, after the effects of the Pandemic in previous years, were excellent with just under a hundred people attending over the day. Many of the people attending used the new guide book which explains details at every point indicated in the guide. Volunteers were on hand to answer the many questions that

emerged. The guide and the information on the pull up banners answered and prompted numerous questions all of which we were able to answer. The guide and banners were produced by Rob Leach, one of our new Wardens who presented our information in a very readable and presentable package. Refreshments were provided for the slightly



exhausted village tour participants who had asked many questions during the walk, all of which were answered by our intrepid guide Geoff Poole.



We also used the day, being an ideal occasion, to re-launch the Friends of Farnworth Church group. We started this project 10 years ago with the initial Roof Appeal for the Chancel and Cuerdley roofs. This had carried on over the years as a major fund raiser for repairs and had been successful with grants from Heritage England etc. to fund almost all of the major works in the church but of late had become less productive due to many things including the effects of the Covid Pandemic. It seemed the right moment to kick start the initiative and complete the rest of the Restoration work. After a brief introduction and explanation of our intentions for the coming year we answered some relevant questions thrown up by the audience. Donations on the day amounted £475 and hopefully more will follow when the advertising campaign gets under way.



Fabric Report. September 2021

Work carries on as we start the next round of Renovations. At present we are in discussions with our Architect and Contractor regarding the proposed work on the toilets and small kitchen in the base of the tower, I will report further as hopefully things progress. We first of all have to raise the funds for the project before we start work so please continue to donate for this essential addition to the church. We are constantly repairing the boundary stone wall , weather permitting, and any exterior stonework around the church. My thanks to Geoff Poole who continues to undertake this task which saves us a large amount of money. He has also repaired some essential stonework in the Bold Family Crypt and painted and made the door secure.

At this moment there is only the roof inspection to take place and this will have to wait until later in the year when all the leaves have dropped and the gutters can then be inspected for any blockages. We have also received a quote for Security Cameras around the church to combat the number of youths assembling at the back of the church and leaving litter and evidence of drug taking. Now that the vegetation is being cut back it gives us a better view of any activities taking place and evidence of those who are responsible. The cost of the equipment is £6,310-80 INC.VAT of which have £4.000 existing the Friends Account. If anyone would like to donate towards the cost of the remaining amount it would be gratefully received and faithfully applied.

Churchyard

Many of you have commented on how good the churchyard looks. This entirely down to the Government Scheme of Community Service. The groups are working seven days a week in all weathers to achieve the results you can see, This will be an ongoing service as they are always looking areas that can be used in the scheme. The Monday



morning group still meet but as we are all getting older the help from these groups is enabling us to keep the church looking an attractive place to visit.

The actual figures above refer to the monies received and paid out in the period.

The adjustments in receipts £9,299 is for Parish share credits for 2021. In expenditure £13,892 is for Parish share owed to Diocese at end of August21.

The total Parish share due for January to August amounted to \pounds 56,217 less credits of \pounds 9,299 = \pounds 46,918 We were able to pay \pounds 33,026 towards this leaving \pounds 13,892 still outstanding to the diocese.

We have been notified by Bishop Paul that the Liverpool Diocese is to receive further sustainability funding from the church commissioners of one million pounds to assist parishes unable to pay their parish share in full. We are hopeful that St Luke's will again benefit from some of that money.

A further payment of £5,000 in September has been made to the diocese.



Thank you everyone for your donations and continued support, in these still troubled times.

Jeremiah 15.16

Read: Your words were found, and I ate them, and your words became to me a joy and the delight of my heart, for I am called by your name, O Lord, God of hosts.

Think: Are you eager to read God's word and allow it to shape your perspective and actions?

Pray: Lord God, guide me when I read your word. Speak to me through the Scriptures. Help me to seek you, listen to you and obey you. Amen

Psalm 18:28

Read: For it is you who light my lamp; the Lord my God lightens my darkness.

Think: In what way can you walk more closely with God? Identify a key step you can take.

Pray: Thank you Lord that I have been reached by your word. Please create opportunities for the Bible to be shared with more people, here in England and Wales as well as around the world. Please inspire mission workers, church leaders and individuals to communicate your promises to others. Amen



Luke the Evangelist



On October 18th, we at St Luke's, along with Christians around the world, will celebrate the feast of St. Luke, whose writings contains the most extensive biography of Jesus Christ. Luke never met Christ in person, but in his Gospel he says that he came to know about Jesus by talking people who were eyewitnesses to all the events of Jesus' life and ministry, his death and Resurrection.

Hearing those stories helped Luke to become a believer, and he wrote his Gospel so that others would come to know and love Jesus. Luke was a doctor and he travelled widely with Saint Paul on his second missionary journey. Because he cared for the physical needs of others, Luke is known as the patron saint of doctors; he is also the patron saint of artists because it is believed that he painted a famous portrait of Mary, our Blessed Mother. In his Gospel, Luke helps us to know how concerned Jesus was for the sick, the poor and anyone in need of help, mercy, and forgiveness. Luke tells us that Jesus came to save ALL people. Through Luke's Gospel, we learn how compassionate and caring Jesus was. Some of the most famous stories Jesus told are found in Luke's Gospel: The Good Samaritan and the Lost Son among them. The symbol for Luke's Gospel is an ox, an animal that was often sacrificed as an offering to God in ancient times. In his writings about Jesus, Luke reminds us of the great sacrifice Jesus made to save all people through his death on the cross and his Resurrection. Between his Gospel and the Book of Acts. Luke wrote 27.5% of the New Testament, that's more than anyone else, including Paul. Even though Luke makes it clear that he wasn't an eyewitness to Jesus' ministry, according to his own writings, he "carefully investigated everything from the beginning". Without Luke's accounts, especially in Acts, it would be hard to imagine how Christianity grew from a small movement within Judaism to what would eventually become the largest religion in the world. Colossians 4:14 is the only passage that actually mentions Luke's role as a physician. Paul wrote: "Our dear friend Luke, the doctor, and Demas send greetings." Luke is also known as the Patron Saint of bachelors, bookbinders, brewers, butchers, doctors, glass makers, glassworkers, gold workers, goldsmiths, lace makers and workers, notaries, painters, physicians, sculptors, solicitors, stained glass workers and surgeons.




