Dear Friends,

Trinity Sunday this year falls on the 15th June, and it has traditionally marked the half-way stage in the Christian year. From Advent, through Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Holy Week and Easter, and the Sunday up to Pentecost, we are reminded of the acts of God for the redemption of all people. We have been encouraged to think about our Christian faith.

In the weeks that follow, (until Advent comes around again!), we are challenged about our Christian Life. Putting it simply, the first half of the Christian year concentrates on doctrine and the second half on duty.

Duty is defined in many ways, but when we talk of it in these terms it is about a moral obligation or a binding force of what is right.

What does that mean for us?

Our 'obligation' is towards God who is the creator, sustainer and redeemer of the World.

And yet we live in a world of great injustice – a world in which the most basic virtues of civility, responsibility, justice and integrity seem to be collapsing or, in some cases, completely missing. We only need to look at what is happening in Gaza and the West Bank, in Southern Sudan, in Ukraine to see examples of this. But this is not a new problem; several decades ago, Mohandas K. Gandhi warned against what he called the seven social sins. He named them as "Politics without principle, wealth without work, commerce without morality, pleasure without conscience, education without character, science without humanity and worship without sacrifice". I think that when you look at what Gandhi said it provides an apt description of both our world and our community.

Several thousand years ago, the writer of the Book of Proverbs wrote, "Where there is no vision, the people perish". So let me ask

What is the vision for our community?

What is the vision for our Church?

These are real questions that we as a Church and a Community need to answer.

It comes down to what we feel and think are important. For me, I would like it if we could remember what Jesus said to his disciples.

'A new command I give you:

Love one another.

As I have loved you, so you must love one another.

By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another.'

Love should underpin everything that we do because 'God is love and those who live in love, live in God. And God lives in them'. We need to try to help others see God reflected in us.

March JAM Club was during Lent and the Bible story was about Jesus going into the desert for 40 days and being tempted by the devil. Our craft was a story wheel to colour in and build that told the story.



In April JAM Club was on Palm Sunday and we heard all about Jesus riding into Jerusalem on a donkey and how the people waved palm leaves and shouted "Hosanna!" We had fun decorating palm leaves and also weaving palm leaves!



Treasurer's Report

Endowments held on behalf of PCC @ 31/12/2024 amounted to £170,760 and we are only allowed to use the interest or dividends from those funds. Restricted Funds £168,445 in the main this year are for the Toilets and Designated Funds £2,829 are for various specific funds like flowers etc

General Fund The most worrying of all the funds. This fund is for the general day to day expenditure of the church, and the Monthly income is going down each month. Sadly, we have lost guite a lot of our regular givers, who have passed away over the last year, and contributions have not been replaced. A few months ago I put an appeal in the church magazine asking for people to become a regular giver by using the parish giving scheme (PGS). I can report that this appeal only added one person to the list making a total of only 37 donating that way. This brings in a total of £2600 per month. We still have a few paying by standing order, which brings in another £500 per month, ideally this way of donating is mainly for non-tax payers. Yet again I would ask, if gift aiding donations please use the PGS scheme, not by standing order. The cash donations are down considerably, in fact last month there was less than £500 on the plate and that included Baptisms. The church needs a minimum of £10,000 per month just to pay the regular bills, and you will see from the above figures they only add up to £3600. With other forms of income, i.e. funerals, weddings, investment income, fund raising we might reach the £5000 per month mark.

Things have to change, at the moment we have just been paying all the regular bills, except the Diocese for the parish share. At the end of 2024 we owed £104,500 in parish share, and at the time we had no way of paying it. However, over the last year we have been in discussions with the Diocese about the property at Bold, formerly Bold Mission, which has been rented out to a nursery since September 2007, on a 15 year lease. After a lot of research, (our thanks to Ray and Pam Roberts for their hard work and visits to the archives in Prescot ,Preston and Chester) we have the proof that St Luke's own this property, not the Diocese. The rent owed to us for that period is around £110,000+, we are just awaiting confirmation from the Liverpool Diocese Board of Finance, that the money owed to us is to be offset against our parish share arrears.

The rent from October 2022 to June 2024 will be repaid to us direct from the Diocese in a one off payment. The new lease started in July 2024, and we have now been repaid the amount that the LDBF received from the tenant for the 6 months in 2024 and 3 months in 2025. Since April 2025 we have now started to receive the rent direct from the tenant, the quarterly amount after management fees being £4,181, annually £16,724. This is a welcome addition to the General fund income, but we have to remember that Parish share is £6,254 per month, so it will cover just under 3 months. Going forward in 2025 we have got to start to pay our way. Hopefully we can entice groups to hire the church, now we have the facilities to do so.

I hear the phrase "our church" mentioned a lot, but people are going to have to realise that if they want "their church" to still be here for when their children get married, have families of their own, then they need to support it financially. If they don't then the church, like many others, will CLOSE. Please tell everyone you know. I will leave it in your hands to spread the word. Thank You. Yvonne Horabin



None of them remembered much about the celebrations in 1945 but each of them spoke about being relieved that Rationing would soon be ending and there would be oranges and bananas to eat.

Midge Baker, who worships with us on Sundays, is also a Golden Oldie; she had a memory she shared with me and she gave me permission to share it with people at the Wednesday service and with you in the Magazine!

Apparently, Midge's Mum had been given a jelly, a very precious treat in those war years; she put it safely in the sideboard ready for the party they were planning once war was over. However, Midge found this jelly and took little bites out of it so that when her Mum came to make the special jelly for the VE Day street party, there was less than there should have been! Midge also remembered going from West Bank, where she and her family lived, all the way up to Victoria Park where the children were all presented with commemorative medals. They all expressed the fact that they felt blessed to have survived the war unscathed.

I also remember a special War memory shared with me by the late Edna Hutchinson, Lynne Taylor's Mum. Edna and her sister were due to be evacuated to Blackpool and their Mum told them that they could each take ONE toy, just the one. Edna chose her doll's pram; you can imagine that this caused quite a few problems on the journey as they had to change trains several times. Sue

Fabric Report

Now that we have our toilet project up and running there only remains some minor adjustments to complete what has been a tremendous effort by all concerned.

We now have to work out how those amenities will benefit the finances of the church. By this I mean a programme of having an open church which will require members of the congregation stepping forward to make it possible.

For the future we have other projects that need to be discussed and implemented. At present we are receiving grant information to install Solar Panels on some parts of the church roof. Eco Grants from the Diocese are available so we need to explore this possibility.

Our final large project will be the Nave roof which will require removing the existing roof membrane and replacing it with a more up to date membrane which will allow it to breathe. If we don't replace it eventually it would cause rot in the wooden supports and it would be an even bigger job. Although it sounds a simple job it would require the slates being removed and the new membrane attached. The slates would then be replaced to complete the job. A scaffolding roof would be essential while work is carried out so the services could possibly carry on. There are generous grants available but it would require a sizable input from the church as well. To this end we will need to start a Roof Appeal in the coming months which could possibly take a couple of years to reach our goal. But it is not unsurmountable as we have done it all before. I hope you will join us in this endeavour which will be essential if this church is to be preserved as a beacon for Christianity for another thousand years.

MOTHERS' UNION

Our meeting on 9th April was led by Sue Connolly. She started the meeting with prayers from the MU book and Sue said a special prayer for the passing of Gladys Holland, a former Deanery President. Thank you, Sue, for bringing along prayer cards from the Cathedral.

Our speaker was Rev Canon Peter Dawkin, telling us of his journey to St Luke's. Peter was born in Liverpool and has a brother, Leslie. His infant school was St Michael's and after passing his 11+ he went to Prescot Grammar School. He was in St Michael's Church choir from the age of six until, at the age of 14, he drifted away from church, like so many teenagers do, sadly. At 16, Peter took a 4-year apprenticeship with a telecommunications company which included day release at college. He became a lecturer, and a friend got him back involved with the church. He had no intentions of going into the ministry but if God has a plan for you, then things happen. Events are presented to you, and it becomes clear what you are to do. He studied theology at the age of 23 and went before the selection committee. He was grilled for 1½ hours, all the time thinking he was not going to get through - but he did! There was additional training which sent him to different churches. At Wigan, he met our previous minister, Rev Bob Pearson. Peter was given the Parish of Christ Church in Norris Green, a very difficult place to minister. He learned that teaching Love was the answer, as sin was something everyone knew and faced daily. He stayed for 10 years and during that time was married and fathered two boys. However, living in such a difficult place took its toll on his marriage and they divorced. He is now married to Rev Linda, who leads the congregation at St Michael's and St Thomas's Church in Ditchfield Road in Widnes. They first had twins, followed by Sam who sadly did not survive, and then later Ben arrived. Ben is healthy and a blessing to them all. For 18 months. Peter filled in wherever he was needed. His mother moved in with him and Linda after she was attacked in her own home. He was vicar of St Basil's & All Saints in Hough Green when the vacancy at St Luke's came up. He applied and was successful - and knows he must be staying with us, as his name is now on the noticeboard! We are all pleased to have him with us

He accepts he does not know all the answers to everything, never will and does get things wrong. So, very human.

Sue thanked Peter for talking so openly to us. It was enlightening to hear all that he has done and the problems he and his family have had to face. Thanks again, Peter.

It was a beautiful day for our coffee morning in church on 7th May. following the morning service. It was our first coffee morning using the lovely new servery, which is very modern and well-equipped. We are still getting used to it! We had plenty of tasty treats. The bring & buy table was full and there was a lovely selection of raffle prizes to be had. Although we were low in number, we raised £199.67, so well done everyone. The books left over are still available in church, with that money going to St Luke's. Thank you to all who attended and contributed to a relaxing morning. We met again on 14th May, when, as we do each year, we received an update on the work of Christian Aid. Our speaker was Alastair Johnston, Church Engagement and Fundraising Officer for this region. After we all said the Mothers' Union Prayer, Colleen welcomed Alastair, who then posed the question, "Why am I here?" He said it was because of his faith, and faith is Hope. Christian Aid (CA) is celebrating 80 years this year, the same amount of time that we have been celebrating Victory in Europe. Its origins involved helping refugees at the end of the war. One of his slides showed three pictures: an earthworm, Charles Darwin and Stonehenge. What was the connection? Not obvious at first but apparently Darwin was interested in earthworms. The stones of the henge are now deeper in the ground than they were when first erected. Why? The work of many years of the earthworm working in the soil. So, the point is that even the smallest thing that each of us does can create a big change. Hope is unstoppable. Alastair showed us how CA has helped people over the years and how they are ready to go into action as soon as disaster strikes. He feels if you stop wars, you will stop poverty. Each year CA concentrates on a particular country. In 2025 the focus is on Guatemala. We watched a video about Aurelia, a mother of eight children and grandmother of five. She is a farmer - the men of the village work away. The land is difficult for growing crops, with heatwaves and storms. With the help of CONGCOOP (The Coordination of NGOs and Cooperatives, of which CA is a partner, supports the organized return and reintegration of civil war

refugees into Guatemala) she is able to grow natural plants that can withstand the harsh climate. This includes cacao, to be made into chocolate that she can sell for a good price. Aurelia is also a leader in her community, helping others. Collecting water for the farm involves four hours of walking every day!

Christian Aid Week is their flagship for promoting CA's work, but fundraising goes on all year round and they also receive money from wills. Alastair's last slide showed the words Give, Act, Pray.

Give: through donations and fund-raising.

Act: getting governments to change.

Pray: to remember CA and their work in our prayers.

As he said, "don't be discouraged, small things help bigger things happen."

Colleen thanked Alastair for coming to speak to us and inspiring us to do things to help those in need. CA's mission is similar to MU's: helping people in need to be educated and able to make a living, which helps their families and communities. We are all equal in the sight of God. An envelope for donations was circulated and a total of £238.00 has been sent to CA to help with their work. Thank you to our members and guests.

Bring the best robe and put it on him. Put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. 23 Bring the fattened calf and kill it. Let's have a feast and celebrate. 24 For this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found.' So they began to celebrate.

25 "Meanwhile, the older son was in the field. When he came near the house, he heard music and dancing. 26 So he called one of the servants and asked him what was going on. 27 'Your brother has come,' he replied, 'and your father has killed the fattened calf because he has him back safe and sound.'

28 "The older brother became angry and refused to go in. So his father went out and pleaded with him. 29 But he answered his father, 'Look! All these years I've been slaving for you and never disobeyed your orders. Yet you never gave me even a young goat

so I could celebrate with my friends.30 But when this son of yours who has squandered your property with prostitutes comes home, you kill the fattened calf for him!'

31 "My son," the father said, 'you are always with me, and everything I have is yours. 32 But we had to celebrate and be glad, because this brother of yours was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found."

Are you worried that there might not be quite enough grace for you?

Where can you see signs of God's abundance? What might be the consequences of believing in an abundant God?

How justly do you feel the father behaved? Would you forgive the younger son?

What is the role of compassion in justice?
