Club and JAM Club are regulars and over the year we have been delighted to open our doors to both Farnworth and Lunts Heath Schools for visits and for worship.


We are looking forward to the groups unveiling their 2023 Christmas window displays and joining us for their Advent and Christmas presentations.

Place a candle in the hole and wedge it firmly into the orange.

Thread sweets or sultanas onto 4 cocktail sticks

Put in the sticks into the orange and you are all ready! Please take your Christingle and candle home to light on Christmas Day.

As you enter and when leaving there will be baskets for a collection for the Children's society, a Christian organisation who work tirelessly with children and young people to improve their lives. 








A VISIT TO ST MARY'S CHURCH, GRASSENDALE





A group of 16 visited the church on 5th October as part of a regular tour of churches which will continue in 2024. St Mary's church is a Victorian building and is styled decorated, Gothic revival and has been a place of worship since 1853. A youngster compared with St Luke's.

It has a north-west tower with a broach spire. It is built mainly of sandstone and the roof is covered by hexagonal slates.

It's a grade 11 listed building designed by the architect Arthur Hill Holme and was built to serve the residents of the private estates of Grassendale Park and Cressington Park where there are some fine dwelling houses round about.

The church has many fine stained-glass windows see the photos below, together with plaques to recognise those folk who have supported the church in many ways over the years and we often find this.

There are also side chapels. The Garnett Chapel built in one of the transepts was dedicated to Theodore Garnett a church warden for over thirty years. Other notables were A. D. Watts born in New York but a British citizen. Hugh Gaskell Sutton, a significant figure in the Garston community has a window dedicated to him. There are war memorials commemorating those who lost their lives in The Great War and were pupils of St Mary's C of E School. The school closed in 1990 due to lack of teachers



This picture shows the chancel that has a canted (oblique-angled) apse. The altar windows depict Christ the King and also commemorates John Evans the first vicar of Grassendale.

The original organ has long gone. The present organ, which has 1100 pipes, was rebuilt and moved to its present location by Rushworth and Drapers of Liverpool in the late 1960s.



In the early days of the church, families could rent their own pews which had doors and were numbered and this practice did not cease until 1920.

The new pulpit is quite grotesque poorly designed and an anachronism (not my words but I do agree it is a very poor example).

We enjoyed our visit having been warmly welcomed with tea and biscuits rounded off with a meal at the Britannia Inn on the river side

I will be arranging more visits, probably every six weeks or so on a Monday, Tuesday or Thursday and anyone interested should let me know. If there is somewhere you would like to visit please let me know as nothing has yet been organised. Geoffrey Poole

Beatitudes

On Sunday 5th November at Cronton Mission it was Café Style Worship. And we started our service by making yummy treats – Rocky Road Clusters. The first thing we needed was a recipe - a set of instructions, including a list of all the ingredients.

We worked together and weighed out the ingredients melted and mixed and then spooned into paper cases. Then the important job of sharing out the various mixing bowls and spoons to be licked! Why were we doing this at church you might well ask? Well, the Bible reading for the day was taken from Matthews Gospel (5:1-12), The Beatitudes. I am sure you know the passage I am referring to: "Blessed are those who ..." Some translations of the Bible use the word "happy" instead of "blessed".

I like that the word "beatitudes" has two parts to it: be and attitude. The Beatitudes are ways that we can 'be' and 'attitudes' we can have. Another word for attitudes, is behaviours, how we should behave, what we should do.

Basically, this is Jesus' recipe for us to be happy. Let's look at a few of these 'be-attitudes'. Jesus said to:

Be kind when people are sad or hurting

Be peacemakers when people are fighting

Have an attitude of pure thoughts (think nice things)

Have an attitude of wanting to do right.

Jesus also said that when we are sad, God comforts us and then we are happy.

Just like when we made the Rocky Road Clusters, we followed the recipe to ensure we had the right ingredients and mixed them together in the right way to produce yummy treats that definitely

made us happy. We can follow Jesus' recipe

CRONTON CE School and Mission

One of the most important priorities in line with the vision of St Luke's church and Cronton, is to deliver mission in collaboration and partnership with the local community.

Looking back over the past 2 months, we have achieved this in abundance. Let me share with you some of the services and opportunities we have had to deliver and experience worship with our school, the East Widnes team, and wider community in Cronton.

School assisted Lesley and Clare in leading 2 services in October – the Y5 "gardeners" introduced their Reception "seedlings" on the first Sunday, children were presented with seeds or a bookmark to remember the occasion. Key stage 2 children lead Harvest on the second Sunday. Donations, as at St Luke's church, were to







The East Widnes TEAM SERVICE took place at Cronton on the 5th Sunday in October, led by Arch Deacon Simon Fisher. St Luke's church and St Ambrose, came together with Cronton for a service of Holy Communion. It was lovely to welcome the Archdeacon and show him our use of the school building for worship.

The whole village community including the 3 churches, Parish Council, 2 schools, businesses, police and local organisations came together on Remembrance Sunday. We met at the War Memorial with a further short service at the Methodist Chapel. The Ecumenical service preparations for Christmas are already underway,





Rev'd Bob's last service at Cronton took place on the 24th September. One of the lectionary readings for that week, the 17th Sunday after Pentecost, was the Parable of the worker (Matthew 20 1-16). This, to me, seemed very apt, at a time when Bob's retirement as a worker in the formal sense, was so imminent. Wendy, Sue and Hannah processed the crosses to open and close worship, and we sang

one of Bobs favourite hymns, "My song is love unknown", which was also included in his final service at St Luke's church on 15.10.23. School celebrated collective worship with Bob for the final time on the 9th October where the children were excited to present Bob with gifts to furnish his "Man shed" which he had often talked about. We thank Bob for his leadership at St Luke's church with Cronton Mission in worship and organisation, and for his inclusivity of our children. Both Cronton Church and the School family wish Bob and Alison, a happy, heathy, and fulfilling retirement with their wider family.

We must also give thanks to God that Rev'd Ray felt well enough to lead us in Holy Communion at Cronton. With the assistance of Lesley, he led his first service in over 3 years on the 22nd October. Debbie Doyle

Fabric report

Since my last report we have received a quote from our Contractors for the toilet project of £188,000 plus Vat. We still need to confirm the direction of the drains to avoid any graves before work can begin in the New Year.

On Friday 27th October in the early evening, a speeding car, coming up Farnworth Street, hit the last speed bumps which caused the driver to lose control and the car ploughed into the church wall to the right of the main gates, between the lamp post and a sign post. It demolished the 15th century sandstone wall,









The driver of the car ran off into the churchyard, but was later arrested by the police. As the car belonged to the driver, the police were able to access his details quite quickly. The whole incident was captured on the CCTV cameras at the corner shop. It was very fortunate that no one was walking near the church or any cars parked by the shop at the time. The car was finally removed by the police just after midnight. The area was made safe by Geoff and I on Saturday morning.

Hopefully an Insurance claim will cover the majority of the damage, but the repair to the Celtic cross will be expensive, as it will require a specialist stone mason to do the work. A repair to one of the gargoyles recently cost £8,000, so this repair will possibly be double that amount.

The next day the clean-up operation began and I was helped by Geoff Poole and Stuart Anderson plus a passer by Dave who had been concerned at the damage that had been caused. This offer of help was most uplifting as was the concern expressed by the people of Farnworth as they went about their daily business. The accident had gone viral on social media which was picked up by the local and national papers as well as the BBC news. I was asked to give a report which appeared in local papers and media news. On the 7th November I met with one of the Stone masons with regard to the restoration of the wall and cross which was guite pleasing as the work would be pretty straightforward from their point of view. This alleviated my concerns as I thought some of the stones would prove to be unusable. The following day I met with another Stone mason whose findings were similar to the previous findings. I now wait for the quotes from both companies before deciding which one to use. It was agreed by both companies that work on the restoration would be curtailed as all parties had no clear dates until the New Year.

This will enable us to work on the strength of feeling and raise some funding ourselves as there will be a substantial excess payment to be made to the Insurance company.

Hopefully I will be able to report better news for you in the New Year.

The initial surplus before creditors of £27,224 has been used to pay the outstanding parish share of £26,000 from 2022. By the end of October 2023 £4,500 has been paid to the dioceses for the 2023 parish share, with £55,700 outstanding to them. By the end of the year I would estimate the Parish share creditor for Parish share to be around £60,000. This creditor will be carried forward to 2024 and will NOT be written off by the Diocese. The Diocese is now asking me on a regular basis, as to how and when theses arrears can be paid, and this is a question that I cannot answer. Can You? The Covid Pandemic had a detrimental effect on church funds, and since 2020, quite a few of our regular givers have died, All of your donations help, so please give what you can afford either in church or as below



MOTHERS' UNION

Our meeting on 11th October was led by Christine. We started with prayers. The prayer for peace was very poignant because of the trouble in the Middle East. Paul Delaney, St Luke's Director of Music, came to talk to us about music at St Luke's. Paul has many hats as he puts it. He is a performance poet, organist, composer, teacher and author having 8 books published. Before he came to us, he had taken 4 pupils for piano lessons. He started playing fairly late at the age of 12. His interest was sparked when he found an old organ in his uncle's house in Rainhill. His first public performance was at the age of 14 playing at a wedding. His first job at 17 was playing the organ at Our Lady in Hough Green. The priest was a very loud Irishman that reminded him of the Father Ted programmes. Paul was taught the organ by Ian Tracy in the Anglican cathedral. His family is Catholic and his father said his mother would be turning in her grave knowing he was playing in an Anglican Cathedral. He did think she would be pleased he was talking to the Mothers' Union. In 1999 he started work at St Pauls West Derby as they needed an organist. They averaged 45 weddings a year. It was a 9mile trip each way but he didn't mind it. He stayed there until 2018 when he received an E- Mail from St Luke's who were looking for an organist. When starting work at St Luke's, he found it wasn't so different from the Catholic church with the same Gloria and the Holy Holy. Paul has played in many venues including the Cathedral and St Georges Hall. He explained why he sometimes played the piano instead of the organ. Some music is written for the guitar some for piano and others for the organ. He has his own unique way of playing by improvising. He played 'Be Still' just as it was written, then he played his version improvising. The members liked Paul's version. Some of the old hymns written for the organ he doesn't change because it doesn't sound right. He demonstrated on the organ and yes, the hymn is better played how it was written. He definitely has a gift and is the only member of the family who plays music. His elder sister is good at knitting and as all knitters know it's a skill in itself. Paul gave us a card with the pupils of St Georges Catholic Primary school in York on the front. On the back were comments from some of the schools he has performed in Hungary, Czech Republic, Italy, Germany, Bahamas. California as well as England in Knightsbridge no less.

The comments were wonderful, he was funny, engaging and inspiring and the children were buzzing for days afterwards. Paul has a stutter and some of the heads of schools looked a bit doubtful but while singing and performing in different voices the stutter goes and afterwards the heads were amazed and full of compliments. Paul told us a bit about the organ. Organs have 2 or 3 keyboards and pedals as well. Everyone agreed that Paul was very talented. We all enjoyed Paul's talk. We would like him to return with some of his poetry.

Our meeting on 8th November was led by Colleen. She read prayers from the MU prayer book written by MU members in Africa. Prayers that were honest and uplifting. The MU is world wide and it's good to hear prayers from other countries. Colleen introduced Vicky, who is the Public Co-ordinator for the Foodbank. Vicky is lovely, open, cheerful person who is ideal for the job. The foodbank has been going for 4 and a half years. They have 200 volunteers and they couldn't deal with the 44thousand meals handed out without these valuable helpers. Vicky sings their praises whenever she can. The number of clients who need help has increased but with everyone feeling the pinch the donations have dropped and they are having to buy in food. Even people working still count on the foodbank. The foodbank comes under the Trussell Trust, working to stop UK hunger. There are 80 referral agents. The agencies give out vouchers for 3 days of food. Pets At Home donate animal food. The vouchers are for emergencies and they do forward clients to other organisations that maybe able to help them long term. Some members said it was hard for many families during and after the war but women learnt to cook to make meals out of just a few ingredients. I don't think schools teach domestic science now like they used to. Maybe that is something schools should look at. Vicky enjoys going into schools and one chid thanked her because her family had to use the foodbank, she was quite moved by this. The harvest festival brought in a well needed boost as the schools and churches gave a lot of food and toiletries. Runcorn and Widnes are run separately but they both help each other. Vicky will send Colleen a list of things they need and also look in the magazine. Colleen thanked Vicky who was pleased to join us. She left with a bag of winter coats that they need for their clients she was delighted to receive them.

5th December is Christmas meal at Riverside College. 12 for 12,30 and the price is £24. £5 deposit was collected at the meeting and the menu was handed round so we could pre-order. 13th December is our Christmas celebration with mince pies, mulled wine and carols. As Daniel is unable to play for us Lorraine Eldridge has kindly agreed to play. Our 10 January meeting is TBA.

Tea Rota for December and January is the committee. I would like to wish you all a happy Christmas and peaceful new year from the committee.

Lord, in this holy season of advent our thoughts turn to the coming of the Christ child and to Mary the mother to be. Give us ever thankful hearts, filled with compassion and understanding, that we may in return share these gifts with others. Amen.


Remembering is important




